SHANE CLAIBORNE TO SPEAK AT LCOB

Shane Claiborne, an engaging voice for radical Christianity who has been speaking at youth conventions across America such as the National Youth Conference this past summer, will be featured at a public meeting in our sanctuary at 7 p.m. on Tuesday, January 4, 2011.

"Another way of Doing Life" will be the subject of his presentation. "Christians are meant to be radical non-conformists, interrupting the patterns of our world with prophetic imagination," says Claiborne. During a time when the public mood is soured by unemployment, endless war, environmental disaster and political corruption, we urgently need Claiborne's message.

Claiborne's appearance in Lancaster is sponsored by the Taxes for Peace Interest Group of the Lancaster Interchurch Peace Witness.

All are welcome, including parents and grandparents. A free will offering will be taken. This is a unique community event happening at our church that you should not miss.



How is seminary going for you?

As many of you probably already know, I am attending Lancaster Theological Seminary part time. I have just finished my third semester. I am on the track to obtain a Masters of Divinity for ordination purposes. Seminary has been quite the stretching experience. One of my greatest hopes of attending seminary was that I would be able to own my theology a little more. I am sure many of you are like me in a way, you grew up in the church and the church did its job. The church taught you or me how to live and especially how to live in the likeness of Christ. Some of you may have experienced this though and asked

these questions, "Are my beliefs actually what I believe or are they something that I have been simply taught to believe? Do I believe them or do I just not know what to believe otherwise?" These are the sorts of questions I asked myself before seminary.

Seminary produced exactly, if not greater, what I had hoped. Surely, I believed in Christ, but what about everything else in life? Seminary has given me the room to explore what others believe in order to more greatly define what I believe. I have gained a greater flexibility and confidence within my faith. This has been especially useful in my interaction with youth. Before seminary, if a youth questioned what I was teaching I would often think I had to have the right answer for them. Sure, there are right answers at times, but I am more capable of exploring their thinking and feel much more competent and confident to do so. Sometimes the youth teach or challenge me to think or believe differently. Because of my exploration of theology, biblical studies and different people, my faith has expanded and grown in ways that I would not have expected from the seminary experience. The richness of my relationship with Christ has been enhanced because of seminary.


