PEACE FORUM, MARCH 20, 2011

An exciting event will be happening in our church on March 20. We will be celebrating our first ever Peace Forum as a congregation.

The Church of the Brethren, one of the three historic peace churches, has a vital role to play in today's world. What is the church's role? What is our role as Christians who claim to be followers of the Prince of Peace? We will welcome two guest speakers on March 20, and their job is to help answer those questions and challenge our thinking and practices.

Jordan Blevins, Church of the Brethren staff for witness, is the coordinator of National Council of Churches' (NCC) ecumenical peacemaking program, associate director of the NCC's Eco-Justice Program, and coordinator of Poverty Initiatives and Washington Internships for the NCC since 2007. Jordan is a member of the Westminster (MD) Church of the Brethren and a member of the On Earth Peace Board.

Jordan will speak in the chapel at 8:00 and at the 10:15 a.m. traditional worship and lead the discussion in the Thoughtful Life Class at 9:00 a.m.

Greg Lazakovits, lead Pastor at Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren since 2006, served as a consultant to the denomination's program in Brazil for two years, assisting with new church starts. Previously, Greg served on the national staff of the Church of the Brethren directing the Washington Office (legislative affairs), and coordinated an Anti-Racism Project for the denomination. Greg will speak at the Morning Psalm services at 9:00 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. After worship and a Soup and Salad lunch, prepared by our youth, there will be a discussion and talkback with Jordan and Greg. The afternoon program will conclude by 2:30 p.m.

As an added bonus for the day, we will learn and sing a new hymn, written by Jay Weaver, titled: "My Peace I Give You."

Mark your calendars. You will not want to miss these exciting events. We hope all of you will attend, regardless of your position on peace and justice issues.

Did you make any resolutions for the New Year?

Resolutions, according to the *American Heritage Dictionary*, involve “being resolute,” which is “characterized by firmness or determination; pursuing a fixed purpose; unwavering.”

Many times our new year’s resolutions involve something we intend to do or not do. For instance, we resolve to eat healthier food and/or exercise more regularly. These are good goals, which often go by the wayside fairly quickly. Many resolutions focus on the self—what I will do for me.

Did you ever stop to consider the fact that you had nothing to do with the family into which you were born? You could have been born in a family where "one in every six people lives on less than a dollar a day" ("Making Poverty History," a Church World Service publication). Those of us who were lucky enough to be born into families here in the USA are very blessed, and with those blessings come responsibilities.

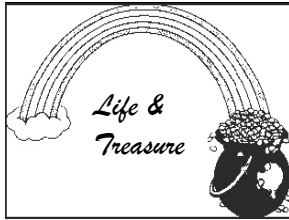
A church in our district a few years ago held a special Thanksgiving meal for its members. It was hosted by the youth, and the members were expecting a traditional Thanksgiving feast. What they saw was quite a surprise and a chance to experience how most of the world lives.

It was set-up as a **World Table**. Members were given numbers when they arrived, directing them to the proper table. The entire event was done in silence. The "first world" table was so full of food that it was difficult to find room for the dinner plates. The "second world" table had less food and more people. There were other tables, including the final table set for the really poor. That was by far the largest group. That table had three legs, no chairs, no dinner plates, no silverware, and only a small loaf of bread and water.

The dinner ended with the first world folks (voluntarily) sharing their food with the others, including the very poor. Following the meal, the youth and a few adult leaders led a time of discussion about what they had experienced. One person observed that it was the worst and best Thanksgiving of his life!

Our table is the "luck of the draw." Are we willing to learn what it means to be poor, and to give our time and money to help make a difference? Our congregation has been working at this faithfully though our 2-Cents-a-Meal offerings, food for the Food Bank, the school uniforms, blankets, meals, winter coats, Health Kits, and much more! Thank you!

PMT ENERGY TIP OF THE MONTH

Power down that PC! The U.S. Department of Energy suggests turning off the computer monitor if unused for more than 20 minutes and turning off both the monitor and the central processing unit if it will be idle for more than two hours. In addition, plug your computer equipment and accessories into a power strip/surge protector. Turn off the strip to prevent the equipment from using power even when turned off, something called "phantom load." Lastly, the Department of Energy says saving energy with ENERGY STAR computers or monitors will only work if you activate the power management features on that equipment.

On Saturday, February 12, 2011 at 7:00 p.m., the Starlight Tea Concert Series is proud to present **Sarah Daughtrey, mezzo-soprano** in concert. Dr. Daughtrey is Assistant Professor of Music and Director of Vocal Studies at Elizabethtown College. She received the DM degree in Vocal Performance and Literature from the prestigious Jacobs School of Music at Indiana University, a BA in Vocal Performance from Austin Peay State University, and pursued graduate studies at the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, where she was a Knoxville Opera Company Apprentice performing in the Educational Outreach program. With UT Opera Theatre, she performed several roles, including Ottavia in Monteverdi's *The Coronation of Poppea*. While at IU, she was privileged to perform as the Student/Singer in a staged version of Argento's song cycle *From the Diary of Virginia Woolf* under the direction of acclaimed baritone Håkan Hagegård with the composer in attendance.

An active soloist and recitalist, Dr. Daughtrey's performances include alto soloist for several works, including Haydn's *Lord Nelson Mass* with the South Bend Symphony Orchestra on the Notre Dame University campus, the Mozart *Requiem* at Lebanon Valley College, and both the Bach *St. John Passion*, and a concert of vocal works by Heinrich Schütz with *Music! Gettysburg* at the Lutheran Theological Seminary.

As with all Starlight Tea concerts, admission is free, with a free-will offering taken. Be sure to bring your friends to hear an evening of beautiful song!

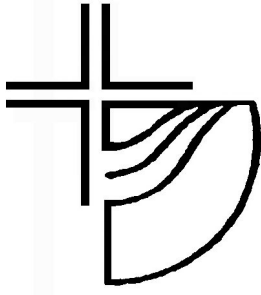
