CONGREGATIONAL BUSINESS MEETING

After Sunday morning worship and a delicious Soup & Salad Lunch provided by the youth of the church, the April 10th spring congregational business meeting was held. Moderator Al Hansell opened the meeting with devotions and prayer. Reports were given by the pastors, auditors, treasurer, Deacons, Executive Committee and all of the Ministry Teams. We heard reports by ...

...the Auditors that the books are in order and that they have implemented uniform reporting standards for future audits.

... the treasurer that our giving this first quarter has been behind about \$18,000 to the Plan of Ministry. There is optimism that this will be made up, given our history of giving.

...the Deacons of the creation of a new fund known as the *In-Reach Program*. This fund would assist persons within the congregation that need financial assistance. An individual will donate \$10,000 if matching funds are given to this program. It is hoped that this fund would eventually have \$100,000 for future assistance activities.

...the Leadership Search Team who is requesting names of persons to be called to fill the following positions: Assistant Chair of Communications Ministry Team; Pastor Relations Team; Auditor; Annual Conference & District Conference delegates.

...The Executive Committee that the positions of Children & Youth Ministries may be filled by persons of the congregation. If anyone is interested in Children's ministries or Youth ministries, let themselves be known to the Executive Committee.

The business meeting approved...

- ...Jim Heck as chair of the Leadership Search Committee.
- ...the calling of Linford Moyer to a three year term as Deacon.

Those in attendance celebrated that the call to build one house in Haiti ended in building five, totaling \$32,500 in giving.

As I sit here in my office in April and my departure from this congregation continues to become more of a reality, I have mixed emotions. I know that I have deliberated over this decision over a course of six months, sought spiritual direction, prayed frequently and God has clearly called me to make this decision, but leaving people that you have established wonderful relationships with is difficult. I can honestly say that I have been blessed by the many friendships of this congregation. I became closest to these friends when we were experiencing challenges together, problem solving and comforting one another.

I do have to admit that I am weary after my time here at the church. I felt I took all the proper steps to make sure I was well supported and spiritually nourished. That being said, I realize how much my soul lacked the ability to just "be" in worship (a difficult task for many pastors). I may have been there physically, but I would be thinking about who I need to talk to after the service or thinking anxiously about what I need to do next in the worship service or I would not be able to attend worship at all because I was working on the next thing that was planned to happen after worship. I have attended Youth Ministry Conferences where I have come back totally refreshed mainly because I was able to love on God and God was able to love on me in the midst of worship. I did not truly appreciate worship until it was almost absent in my life.

I am not willing to call my weariness "burn-out" because of the many negative connotations that can come with that label. No catastrophic incident pushed me to this decision, but there were plenty of "valley" and "mountaintop" moments. I like to think of my time at this congregation as a positive one where I had a hard and fast learning curve to achieve. I believe that I was greatly impacted by many of you and I hope that many of you were impacted by my ministry. I need some time to rest and I believe this was one of many reasons God called me to move on from this congregation. I cannot give you my fullest ministry when I am weary.

Thank you for your mentorship, prayers, overall support and the opportunity to minister to many of you! It has truly been a blessing!

"The Global Food Crisis Fund (GFCF) is the primary way the Church of the Brethren assists hungry people in developing food security. For over 25 years GFCF has provided grants upwards of \$400,000 annually for seeds, livestock, tools, and training directed to helping the poor develop sustainable agriculture. GFCF invests in small-scale economic development, joins efforts to improve diet and health practices, champions soil conservation, and promotes awareness-raising and advocacy on hunger issues. Its grants serve community development programs in 32 countries" (www.brethren.org/gfcf).

While it is important to give help directly to people in need, as we do through our work with the Lancaster County Council of Churches (LCCC), it is equally important to support church programs like the GFCF. This caring denominational program assists people in the tough battle of escaping the cruel clutches of poverty and hunger.

Isaiah wrote, "If you offer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light shall rise in the darkness. . ." (Is. 58:10).

We trust you are gathering the **2 Cents a Meal** offering in your homes. It is important that we remember the hungry each day, especially at mealtimes.






