THANKS TO THE ANGELS

It is a great joy watching the clothing and school supplies arrive each week at church for the homeless students of the School District of Lancaster. At the time of this writing (July 19), we have donated over 60 items of clothing (shirts, blouses, pants, etc.) and lots of traditional school supplies. **In addition, we have donated \$2,015.** A hearty thank you to all the Angels at LCOB!

Some of you have asked good questions about the homeless children. Who are they? Where do they live?

Well, they are children like those who live in our homes. They like to do all the things our children enjoy. They have hopes and dreams just like our kids. However, there is ONE BIG DIFFERENCE. There is no home they can call their own; no private space such as one's very own bedroom. Some of these children live in shelters; most move around to many different addresses during the year—living with relatives or friends, requiring them to attend several different schools within the city during the school year.

An aunt, for example, may take in a couple of nieces or nephews because she cares, but she can't afford to keep them for more than a few weeks. The kids move on to the next unfamiliar place. Some older students work part-time to pay for food, and actually live in abandoned houses and cars. There is no money for field trips and school pictures.

Many of these kids are quite creative, but, since there are so many strikes against them, some give up. Ken Marzinko, the facilitator of the homeless project, strongly believes that education is the escape route from this dehumanizing poverty. The uniforms we are donating will help to encourage them to stay in school. At least they can "look like" the kids who come from stable homes. --The Hunger and Poverty Group

Mary Ellen and I have just enjoyed a visit with an old friend: Rev. Wallace Chappell. Wally is an old friend in both meanings of the phrase – we have known him for many years, and he is indeed “old” but still vital. At age 90, he visited us on a big driving trip from Dallas, Texas, with stops in Louisiana, Alabama, the Carolinas, and New Jersey. He will continue visiting friends and relatives on the way back to Dallas. Quite a tour!

As the pastor of Cochran Chapel United Methodist Church in Dallas, Wally played a very important role in our young lives. Just married, in our early twenties, we settled on Cochran Chapel as our church home, and Wally was just incredible as a pastor, mentor and friend. He sensed that a group of young adults in the church was ready for more in-depth exploration of the Bible and of the vast and broad literature concerning the Christian life. For a couple of years, he personally taught our Sunday School class (called “Nexus”, defined as “a means of connection”). Once he felt we were on our way, he “graduated” us to take turns teaching each other. That experience of learning to study and ponder, in order to share with our friends, helped us all to grow in faith and in learning, and also in support of each other. The Nexus indeed became a means for a disparate group of people to connect and become “family.”

Our recent visit was a time of joy, and of revisiting that feeling of sitting in the presence of a beloved mentor. He spoke with quiet assurance about his sense of God’s constant presence, and of his desire to live as Jesus taught. A poet, Wally is keenly attuned to language, and is constantly seeking the turns of phrase that will comfort, challenge, and “always point to Jesus.”

Most of us have been blessed, once or many times, with mentors that appeared through God’s grace, and helped us become the people we now are. Who were yours? Today, ponder the gifts they gave you, and the gifts that God gave you through them, and utter a prayer of thanksgiving for their lives!

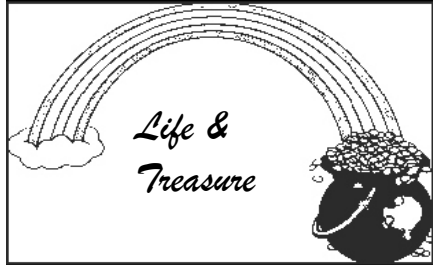

Be An Angel

Recently, while shopping for school uniforms at K-Mart, Lois and I had some interesting conversations with the clerks. Three young ladies assisted us at checkout—one helped to arrange the uniforms into categories, one operated the cash register, and the third person placed them in the cart for us to take to the car. They were very curious about why we were purchasing 100 school uniforms. That gave us an opportunity to explain the *Be An Angel* program at our church. They had no idea that 1000 students would be served by the Homeless Student Project in the School District of Lancaster during the 2010-2011 year. We expect to hear about poverty in “third world” countries, but we don’t expect to learn about that here on our doorstep.

As we were loading the uniforms into our trunk in the parking lot, a lady walked by with a curious look on her face. “We have lots of children,” I said. “It sure looks like it,” she responded. “We have a 1000 children; a 1000 homeless school children in Lancaster,” Lois added. I’m sure the on-looker went away rather confused. She might have thought, “how can there be 1000 homeless children in Lancaster?”

Basic Beliefs & Core Values

This past April, the congregation approved a set of strategic plans for the next several years. All of those plans were submitted to the Church Board in June for implementation. One important item among the various plans is a paper on Basic Beliefs & Core Values. The document sets-forth 20 beliefs and values that are deemed essential for Christians in general and Brethren in particular.

The plan calls for us to publish a special booklet in 2011. The board voted to call Guy Wampler as editor, and he has gladly accepted the call. Twenty members of the congregation will be invited to serve as writers; each one writing a one page narrative on one of the beliefs/values. Jeff Bach, the Executive Director of the Young Center, at Elizabethtown College, has agreed to serve as our reader, making sure the articles are faithful to our basic beliefs as Anabaptists and Brethren. Also, Brethren Press at the denominational office will be interested in seeing our final documents, with the hope of publication to a larger audience.

Church Board Meetings

Our Church Board meets on the 3rd Tuesday of each month, rooms 162-163, 6:30 p.m. These meetings are always open and non-board members are invited to attend. The August 17th agenda will include the first reading of the 2011 budgets as presented by the Executive Committee, the Deacon Body, and the eight Ministry Teams. The Minutes of board meetings are available in the Gathering Place and near the Family Life Center following each meeting.

Staff Evaluations

All staff members (pastoral and non-pastoral) will be evaluated during the month of August. We will receive input from the Executive Committee, the Church Board, task groups serving in specialized areas of ministry (e.g., youth and children), supervisors, and members-at-large.

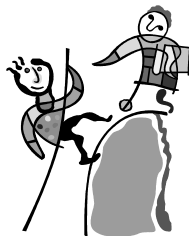

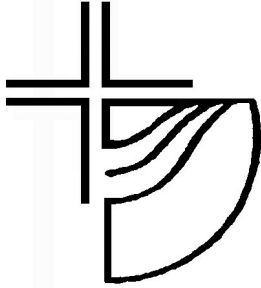
