## THOSE ATTENDING NATIONAL YOUTH CONFERENCE NEED YOUR PRAYERS

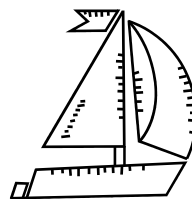
We anticipate that this will add to our faith journey and experience as we seek God's will on our trip.

If you are interested in submitting an article or letter, here's how to do it!

1. The deadline is the 10th of every month.
2. If submissions are emailed, the deadline is the 11th. ***Electronically submitted is best!***
3. Email to **both** the editor and the church office for safety. [csgraham618@comcast.net](mailto:csgraham618@comcast.net)
4. Please do not extensively format emailed submissions. Simple paragraph form is best. No bullet points, graphics, etc. An attached file must be in a *Word* document. Please do **not** create a zip file. *Pasting into the body of the email instead of attaching a file saves the editor several steps and is much appreciated.*
5. Mail any submissions to the church office, attention Peggy Bush, **NOT** to the editor's home.
6. Use the newsletter folder in the office to submit any written or typed submissions.
7. Articles should be in final form when submitted. All approvals and committee revisions should be completed prior to submitting for publication.



This actually happened to me a several years ago. I turned on the water spigot at the kitchen sink and nothing happened. Nothing! Oh no, I thought, the water pipes are frozen. Down the basement stairs I went, hair dryer in hand, to thaw them out. After about 45 long minutes the water flowed again. How did this happen? After I washed the dishes the night before I closed the kitchen cabinets below the sink-not a smart thing to do on cold winter nights. Usually I keep the cabinets open in the most frigid weather, so that warm air can prevent frozen pipes. Sometimes I even let the water drip; moving water is less likely to freeze. But that night the water was turned off and the cabinets closed.

Those frozen pipes are a lesson about our spiritual selves. When our faith is stagnant, we are like those water pipes in the off position during winter-susceptible to freezing. For our faith to be alive and healthy we must allow the Lord to be at work not only within us, individually, but we must allow Him to flow through us, spilling over into the lives of those around us-family members, students, friends, work colleagues, church members, even strangers.

When we keep our faith to ourselves, and do not share it in word or deed, we are in danger of blocking out the warmth of God's life-giving love. Jesus gives life-giving water. Don't let it stagnate or freeze. Why not resolve to share your faith in word and deed, serving others in the name of the Lord?

## A PRAYER FOR CHILDREN by Ina Hughs

*In a recent service, Susan Adsitt gave a heartfelt, sometimes tearful, reading of this powerful poem. It is printed here that we may prayerfully read it again, and having read it, act on behalf of the most vulnerable in our world.*

We pray for the children who put chocolate fingers on everything, who love to be tickled, who stomp in puddles and ruin new pants, who eat candy before supper and who can never find their shoes in the morning.

And we also pray for those who stare at photographers from behind barbed wire, who have never bound down the street in a new pair of shoes, who never played "one potato, two potatoes," and who are born in places that we would not be caught dead in and they will be.

We pray for the children who give us sticky kisses and fistfuls of dandelions, who sleep with their dog and who bury their goldfish, who hug us so tightly and who forget their lunch money, who squeeze toothpaste all over the sink, who watch their fathers shave, and who slurp their soup.

And we pray for those who will never get dessert, who have no favorite blanket to drag around behind them, who watch their fathers suffer, who cannot find any bread to steal, who do not have any rooms to clean up, whose pictures are on milk cartons instead of on dressers, and whose monsters are real.

We pray for the children who spend all their allowance by Tuesday, who pick at their food, who love ghost stories, who shove their dirty clothes under the bed and never rinse the bathtub, who love visits from the Tooth Fairy, even after they find out who it really is, who do not like to be kissed in front of the school bus, and who squirm during services.

And we also pray for those children whose nightmares occur in the daytime, who will eat anything, who have never seen a dentist, who are not spoiled by anyone, who go to bed hungry and wake up hungry, who live and move and have no address.

We pray for those children who like to be carried and for those children who have to be carried, for those who give up and those who never give up, for those who will grab the hand of anyone kind enough to offer it and for those who find no hand to grab.

For all these children, we pray today, for they are all so precious.

## REFUGEE FAMILY NEWS

On behalf of **Omar** Rushdi, **Rajaa** Muhsen, and their 6 year-old daughter **Safa**, we want to thank you for the support you have shown them during this time of need. On March 28, Rajaa gave birth to twin boys, **Ibrahim** and **Ismael**. Ibrahim is in fine health and progressing nicely, but as was expected, Ismael died 20 days later of multiple congenital anomalies. This experience of simultaneous joy and sorrow has been difficult for the family, but they are coping.

The family's financial situation is precarious, as you can imagine. Their generous landlady, Inge Kepple, is providing them rent-free housing and also keeping them well supplied with baby clothes and other supplies. PA state welfare provides medical insurance, food stamps, and some cash assistance. Funeral expenses were minimal, thanks to Scott Brubaker and Young Funeral Home, and have been covered by contributions. At this time our Refugee Funds have been depleted, and we are in **urgent need** of additional contributions. You can give by writing a check to Lancaster Church of the Brethren, with "Refugee Fund" written in the memo line.

Omar has been unable to find a full-time job, even though he has expended much time and effort trying to find one. He tracks down all leads, but so far they have not led to employment. Even the few part-time jobs he has had were temporary and did not last long. Helping him find a full-time job would be greatly appreciated. At this point he needs help (action) more than suggestions!

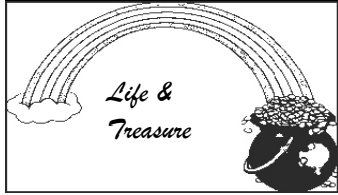

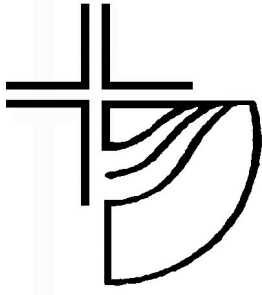
