"I HAVE TAKEN THE CIVILITY PLEDGE." Folks who have received emails from me recently may have noticed those words at the end of my signature file. It seems to me that in so many areas of our national life – political discourse, so-called entertainment, even one-on-one interactions with friends and strangers – the tone and tenor of communications has become unbelievably coarse. Even vile!

We all can name examples of this behavior, whether it's a driver screaming at another in traffic, rudeness to clerks in stores or waiters in restaurants, or aggressive, demeaning speech and actions in relationships. And of course, there are many, many examples on television and in print.

Driven by the never-ending quest for television ratings and dollars, commentators and talk show hosts seem to take delight in being rude or dismissive. Shouting matches have replaced reasoned discussion, and facts and figures are lost in wild, one-dimensional characterizations of opponents. The truth is the first casualty when we are unable to reasonably discuss differences of opinion.

I am deeply concerned about this trend in our beloved country. That's why I was so glad to learn of an organization called The Civility Project (www.civilityproject.org). This group, a coalition of people of good will from all faiths and political persuasions, has devised a simple pledge that we should all be able to embrace. It has three statements:

- I will be civil in my public discourse and behavior.*
- I will be respectful of others whether or not I agree with them.*
- I will stand against incivility when I see it.*

That is my pledge as well, and I hope you will consider taking it too. As Christians, and especially as Brethren, we have a special obligation to stand apart from those aspects of the world that are not in keeping with Jesus' teaching and example. By living an example of love and respect for those with whom we disagree, we can be living examples of the love of Christ.

Another area of our congregation that will receive special attention is our Adult Education Ministry. A new Adult Education Team is being formed to discuss and plan classes, facilities, and technology.

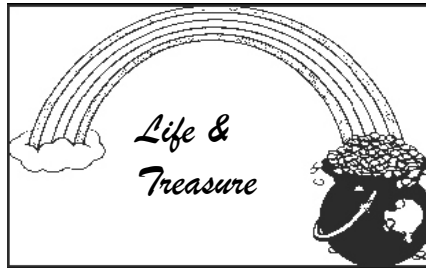

STARLIGHT TEA CHRISTMAS CONCERT SUNDAY, DEC. 20 AT 7:00 PM

One of the most beloved traditions of our congregation is our annual Starlight Tea Christmas Concert. This year's concert, on Sunday, December 20 at 7:00 pm in the Sanctuary, will feature the Chancel Choir, the Carillon Bell Choir, soloists and orchestra in a program titled "*THE GIFT*".

The concert will include familiar carols, an ancient Mass based on old French carols, and a brand-new composition arranged specifically for our choir! The name of the concert comes from the brand-new work, which will end the program. *The Gift of Angel's Wings*, written by Elizabethtown composer Ralph Lehman, was originally written for a *cappella* chorus, but Mr. Lehman kindly offered a new, expanded version of the work to our choir, accompanied by oboe, strings, handbells, piano and celesta. The celesta is a keyboard instrument that makes the sounds of bells, and our new Roland digital harpsichord has a lovely celesta voice. The program includes another modern composition with a link to our congregation: *In Thee is Gladness*, arranged for chorus, flute, handbells and organ by Lisa Bair. Many of you know Lisa, the daughter of Cliff and Hazel Huffman. This sparkling work will help set the tone for our celebration!

Marc-Antoine Charpentier (1643-1704) was a French composer and organist, best-known for the work we will include on our program: the *Messe de Minuit pour Noel*, referred to in English as the *Midnight Mass for Christmas*. This work uses French carol tunes as the basis for the traditional Mass text.

And... what is a Christmas concert without familiar carols! We'll have arrangements of *I Wonder as I Wander*, *Away in a Manger*, and *In Dulci Jubilo*, as well as a wonderful organ solo by our superb organist, Margaret Marsch.

Another beloved tradition is the Starlight Tea following the concert in the Family Life Center, where the ladies of the congregation prepare dozens and dozens of homemade cookies for our pleasure and delight! Be sure to join the choirs for this special concert, and stay afterward to greet the singers and ringers and enjoy some Christmas cheer!

27,000,000

"I [could do] nothing but pray to God. That's about it," said seventeen year old Shyima, who at the age of nine was forced into slavery in a wealthy California household. Shyima was forced to work up to 20-hours a day for the family, being locked inside during her ordeal, often disguised as a cousin of the family. Her family gave her away in hope that she would have a well-paying job to support the family, but she ended up working with no pay.

Since the beginning of Brethren history, the Brethren have held a strong position against slavery. This issue has begun to take a backseat to more publicized issues in our church and culture.

As many of you heard at the recent Sunday School class for A Thoughtful Life, the youth recently attended the annual Brethren Christian Citizenship Seminar (CCS). The topic of discussion throughout the conference was human trafficking and modern-day slavery. The youth as a whole feel very strongly about the issue and are dedicated to fighting slavery in our local, national, and global communities. Our first goal is to educate the congregation and ask for your support in eliminating slavery in our world.

Modern-day slavery is a rather ambiguous term used loosely in discussion of human rights but rarely defined exactly. Slaves are defined as any people who are forced into a situation where they lose control of their life and cannot escape their situation. Various types of modern-day slavery include sex trafficking, labor trafficking, and debt-bondage agricultural workers, or workers who are constantly trapped in a cycle of interest and fees upon a small loan from the slave driver.

One common misconception about modern-day slavery is that slavery only exists in foreign countries in continents such as Africa and Asia. This is a horrible generalization as it neglects the more than 15,000 slaves in the United States alone. Even locally, slavery is a growing, yet ignored, issue. Recently, a sex slavery ring was busted in Harrisburg, where young girls were bused from Toledo to Harrisburg to work in a sex hub.

The largest variety of slavery in the United States is agricultural debt-bondage slavery, generally in Florida, or other southern farming states. In November 2008, two slaves from a farm in Florida escaped through a ventilation hatch in the trailer where they were locked away for the night. The slaves were forced to spend their "free time" in the trailer where they lived in their excrement and were underfed. During the day, the slaves worked twelve-hour days for less than minimum wage. Their captors then charged them for simple amenities such as taking a shower with a garden hose (cost five dollars per person). If they disobeyed their captors, they were beaten until they were bruised and bloody. These conditions are common for farm-workers who raise tomatoes and other produce for nationally recognized restaurants such as Subway and Chipotle Mexican Grill. By purchasing from companies that employ slave labor, we are inadvertently encouraging modern-day slavery.

While 15,000 slaves may sound like a large number, it is only a small percentage of the 27 million slaves in bondage worldwide. A majority of slavery occurs in South Asia where selling children into slavery is a common practice for poverty-stricken families. Prostitution is almost an accepted industry in some countries where personal rights are ignored in favor of profit. Indian carpet factories are staffed by thousands of indentured children stolen or bought from their families at a young age and forced to work long hours in cramped, uncomfortable spaces.

While "rescuing" slaves may sound like a valiant goal, fixing slavery is a more difficult task than imagined. Once slaves are returned to their homes, they face immigration and logistic issues. They are often denied government services because of their undocumented alien status. In some cases, the slaves are criminalized for their inability to produce proper paperwork or comply with the government in federal investigations. In even worse situations, some slaves are kidnapped or purchased from their homes again, once they return to their communities, as the actual slave trade in the area has not been stopped, only a small portion disbanded. A more realistically ideal strategy to fighting slavery is to eliminate the slave trade completely. Prevention is the best method of eradication.

These stories and statistics have created a passion within our youth group towards eliminating slavery to the best of our ability. 27 million people are relying on the assistance of the free citizens of Earth to rescue them from their imprisonment. Our group will be setting up a booth in the Gathering Place in the coming weeks to support the rights and freedom of these slaves. We will be asking for congregational donations to support children rescued from slavery as well as efforts against child slavery, and would appreciate any support you can provide. Thank you for making a difference.

Ed. Note: This article presents us all with an opportunity to bring hope to those with none. What better goal at Christmas?

BOOK REVIEW

WWJD? Some years ago, a group of members at a Reformed Church in Holland, Michigan made a commitment to shape their lives around the question: "What would Jesus Do?". This question may sound uncontroversial but the moment we get specific, it suddenly gets more complicated when we consider the implications.

John Roth, author of the book, Choosing Against War, presents a framework for a practical Christian life that embraces the world with a non-violent love that is stronger than our fears...even if it means humiliation, suffering or death. Christian humility begins with a positive assertion that we are God's children, made in his image, created for Shalom, with an inherent dignity and stature that cannot be taken away.

Instead of exacting "an eye for an eye", which feeds the endless cycles of war and violence, could we, having received God's gracious (undeserved) gift of love, try to express that same love to others, including *especially* our enemies? When Jesus said, "Love your enemies." could he have meant, "Don't kill them."?

Because of our identity with Christ, should Christians respond differently to the world's pain? Is God's love stronger than our fears?

Over the past 36 years the Lancaster CROP Walk has raised more than \$4,000,000. Carlos has raised approximately \$20,000 of that total!

Don't forget these important facts about world hunger. 6 million children under the age of 5 die annually as a result of hunger and malnutrition. 1.2 billion people in developing countries live on an income of \$1 a day or less.

CROP/CHURCH WORLD SERVICE helps stop hunger in 80 countries by teaching people how to have a future with food through technological assistance, seed and tool programs, by building wells with safe, clean drinking water, by food cooperatives and by creating more efficient agricultural methods.

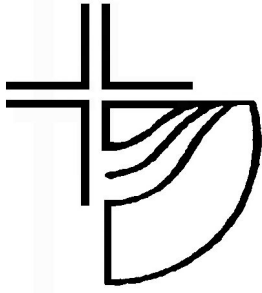
