## ARE ANY OF THESE STATEMENTS FAMILIAR?

*"When I am not in church, No one even knows I am missing."  
"No one has ever contacted me, so I guess I am not  
important."  
"I just stopped going but no one contacted me to ask WHY."  
"I attend regularly but I received a card saying I was missed,  
why?"*

This is a story about a couple who were members of a local church. They were active members on committees and he was an officer of the church for 7 years. However, after 16 years they were no longer getting any inspiration from the message and learned the standards of the church were changing and those changes were unacceptable. Well, enough was enough and they left the church. It took 3 years for someone to realize they were not attending.

Well, finally, they received a call from a deacon who wanted to visit and talk to them. When the deacons arrived, they were surprised to learn that no one had been in contact with them for the past 3 years. It was too late because the couple found another church family where they are now attending on a regular basis.

We do not want that to happen to our members.

This statement is in each bulletin: *"We care about all our church family members and friends, please take time to let us know you were here today by signing the attendance register."*

While we would like to track everyone in attendance, it is extremely difficult to accomplish in our four services. Therefore, when you are a regular signer of the attendance register and for whatever reason are absent for four consecutive Sundays, your absence allows us to send you a card letting you know you are missed. Please be sure you pass the register book and invite visitors to sign. By helping in this manner, we can see when it is time to ask a regularly attending visitor if they would be interested in a membership with our church.

Finally, it only takes a moment to sign the attendance register each Sunday. It is the ONLY true way to make sure we know of your presence.

As I am in seminary at Lancaster Theological Seminary, I am finding that I am being deeply challenged on many levels. For one of my classes I read an article by Anabel Proffitt and Chuck Melchert titled "Playing in the Presence of God: Wonder, Wisdom and Education." In this article, I was struck by their opening paragraph:

*"In a secular and postmodern world, most of those who give little credence to religion and religious activities do so because they have notions of what counts as religion. Many of those notions they have received from religious institutions and persons, who have conveyed the idea that religion is primarily about certain beliefs about God and about moral conduct, mostly what one shouldn't do (ten commandments), deriving from a "picture" that the divine and the human are essentially connected by a relation of sin, guilt, blame and atonement, forgiveness, absolution and salvation, all mediated through religions hierarchy."*

The rest of the article articulates an argument for how we oftentimes undervalue the importance of presence and play. What they mean by "play" is very simple; to enjoy the company of others and see God in it. Sometimes the most deeply profound ideas of God come through laughter, a child's "first...", or through nature. When we are in social settings and forming relationships with people, God is at work.

I find that this is profoundly true as I minister to youth. Most times I do not have the most deep and meaningful conversation during times of Bible study or lecture. Those conversations that are going to stick both with me and with the youth happen at times when we are just being; when we are just being sincerely and utterly ourselves. The most moving conversation happen at times when we are waiting to do one thing to the next or even when we are playing games around the church. The both scary and wonderful part about being a youth minister is learning with the youth. We can often think that to be older must mean that we know more, but the reality is we can learn as much from the young as we can from the old. Wisdom is not necessarily associated with age. To be wise is not a matter of knowledge, but a matter of being connected. This makes us all co-learners.

In order to break some of the beliefs of the people of Christian institutions and Christians, it may greatly depend on practicing being present and playing. I am not talking about doing this haphazardly, but doing this intentionally. To acknowledge the presence of God while you are being present with others makes a huge difference when we are walking and talking with people. If we want others to know God the same way we have come to love and know God, we must do well at being present, like any other spiritual practice.

# CONGREGATIONAL NEWS

## SHOULD WE DO MORE?

The Stewardship Ministry Team recently released a special report of outreach giving by the LCOB. The report is on page 21 of the packet for the Congregational Meeting, April 18, 2010.

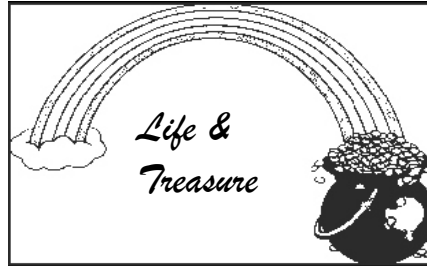
According to this timely report, our congregation gave \$235,572 to outreach ministries in 2009. This represents **42%** of our over-all program expenses. This level of financial giving is truly remarkable, and merits celebration. A church that gives at that level is a church that truly affirms the teaching in Matthew 25:40: "Truly, I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me" (NRSV).

The report states that the dollar amount above does not include donations of school supplies for homeless children, regular donations of food, coats and blankets for the Lancaster County Council of Churches, Christmas gifts for the Angel Trees, White Gifts, and several other projects. These gifts actually add thousands of dollars more to our giving.

This is a glowing report, and it may seem inappropriate to suggest that we should do more. While we do superbly well in our financial giving, we do less well in our personal involvement. For example, we struggle to find volunteers to go to the Church World Service headquarters in New Windsor, Maryland, to process items for shipment to disaster areas. At the time of this writing (4/10), there are 6000 Health Kits at New Windsor waiting for volunteers to process them for shipment to Haiti. Our monthly trip to the Water Street Rescue Mission to help serve a prepared meal has been discontinued due to the lack of volunteers. We have been unable, in recent years, to organize a work crew to go to disaster areas to help with clean-up and to rebuild houses.

**Should we do more?** The church could not do all that it does without our generous financial giving, but we hope and pray that more of us, as we are able, will give more of our personal time and energy to the congregation's outreach ministries.

Hunger and Poverty Group



Pompeii was a flourishing city in Southern Italy until 79 AD. Suddenly, for two days Mt. Vesuvius erupted and completely destroyed Pompeii

in all its pomp. The city was covered in meters of ash and pumice for 1700 years until it was accidentally discovered in 1748.

When archaeologists began excavations in 1910 they uncovered a petrified woman clutching some of the finest jewelry ever recovered from the ancient world. She was apparently attempting to flee the doomed city, and in her haste, holding desperately onto her valuable possessions -- she lost her life.

During its time Pompeii was a magnificent city, yet its destiny was destruction by a nearby volcano -- and so it is with our world today. There's so much beauty on our planet earth -- yet its destiny is certain! The day is soon coming when its elements will be destroyed with fire, the earth and everything in it, laid bare, [2 Peter 3:10] -- and our earthly possessions will not come with us into glory, (only what we have done with them).

As the Apostle Paul said, we came into this world with nothing -- and when we leave this world, we take nothing with us. We can make the mistake of holding too dearly onto our earthly possessions, making them our "treasure", (rather than storing treasure where moth and rust do not corrode etc.) -- but this is a costly error, as illustrated by our "petrified lady".

Instead, let's remind ourselves that we are stewards of God's possessions, responsible to use them with His interests in mind, to further His Kingdom with the things He has entrusted to us.

With so much work to be done, let's never allow our earthly possessions to petrify us with greed or fear thus preventing the eternal work we were preordained for, and stealing our eternal rewards.

In the past I have heard that the feet washing was something symbolic. As my feet were being washed, I felt so impressed that I did not see the brother, but I saw Jesus washing my feet. To be sure of what I was seeing, I looked around and observed the calmness and the tranquil atmosphere. So much reverence, I perceived Jesus was washing the feet of the people at each table that I could see." Brother Luis said that he would like to participate in LCOB's Love Feast in the future.

## BUY A KEY WITH DEE AND ME!

If you were in one of the services on April 11, you heard about the latest way you can support our project to upgrade our sanctuary organ - a campaign called "Buy a Key With Dee and Me!" John and Dee Zimmerman, fundraising chairs of the Sanctuary Instrument Fund, cordially invite you to have a very personal stake in our organ upgrade, by funding the cost of one or more keys on the enhanced organ!

There are a total of 215 keys on the organ, divided among three keyboards and a pedalboard (the thing Margaret plays with her feet). To accommodate different budgets, we've set suggested donations for each key that vary depending on which keyboard the key lives. Our hope is to have commitments for EVERY key on the organ by the end of May! And we hope that the bulk of the giving can be completed throughout the summer, so that we can begin the long process of completing the design and preparing for the upgrade. Of course, if you'd rather make a donation if any amount rather than buying a key, that's fine too - any help you can give is deeply appreciated!

In the April 11 services, we distributed flyers that detail the project, and give you a way to respond by filling out the form and returning it in the offering or to the church office. If you did not receive a flyer or would like another, they are available from the church office. Thank you for your support of this upgrade, designed to prepare our organ for another 50 years or more of service to the glory of God!

# YOUTH NEWS

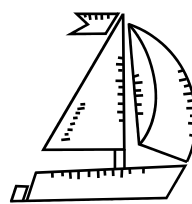

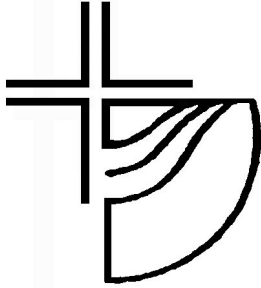
