## NEWS FROM ANE DISTRICT CONFERENCE

October 8-9, 2010

Loeffler Chapel on Elizabethtown College Campus

Pastor Robert DiSalvio introduced himself as the first Italian moderator of ANE District. Phill Carlos Archbold, his former pastor in Brooklyn, preached at the Friday evening worship service. Music groups from Alpha and Omega, Germantown, and the Arabic congregation in Brooklyn, added to the racial and ethnic diversity on the stage. Overall speakers were dynamic and a variety of videos added to the spirit of the conference.

Two names on the slate of officers for the district were of special interest to LCoB: Robert Wintsch, formerly of our congregation, was called to be moderator-elect; Suzanne Schaudel will serve on the District Board and Commission on Nurture.

Juniata and Elizabethtown colleges reported remarkably good enrollment in their freshman classes. COBYS Family Services facilitated 38 adoptions and added an additional counselor to their staff to provide "attachment and trauma therapy" for foster children.

Undercurrents of tension could be felt throughout the conference related to dissent and division in the church over the issue of homosexuality. District delegates to Annual Conference announced that four "special response hearings for dealing with strongly controversial issues" have been scheduled for October. Over 200 people already signed up for the Lancaster County hearing that will be held at Lititz CoB on October 18.

Nineteen congregations with an average attendance of fewer than 65 have been invited to participate in a special retreat on revitalization, and the district is seeking partnerships between small churches and large churches.

LCoB delegates in attendance were Russ Adsitt, Linda Byers, Curtis Dehmey, Guy Wampler, Calvin Wenger, and Jay Wenger.

Most churches have a desire to grow in some way, shape or form. They want to grow deeper in their spiritual life, grow numerically in attendance and membership, or grow in ways to serve. The problem is that in many churches there have to be changes in order for growth to happen! And, too often there is strong resistance to the very changes that will foster the growth that the church desires.

Let me offer a different way of thinking about what needs to be changed. We need to ask questions that honestly looks at where we are and why any change is necessary. What will it take to live the change we would like to see? If we need to move from "here" to "there", what would "there" look like?

If church is about relationships, can we build new kinds of relationships with possible new members? Can we put ourselves in the shoes of people who are new to a church community and ask the kinds of questions they might ask? Think about our church...you are new here...and as you look around you are asking:

- "Can I make friends in this church?"
- "Is there a place where I will fit in?"
- "Does this church want or need me?"
- "Can I be me here?"

These are relational questions. They are questions about how much we care about what others have to offer. They are questions about being authentic and open to new voices and ideas, and about how open we are to change.

If the answer is "no", or a question mark, that means they will leave after a few months or sooner. If the answer is "yes", then what changes need to be made to create a church culture/environment where their "yes" is confirmed?

Are we a church that befriends, makes room at the table, desires the input others bring and gives them the freedom to be themselves?

Let us pray and give thanks for the church we were and are and are becoming in God's grace and guidance. Amen.

### More than enough...

*II Corinthians 9:6-9 (New Living Translation)*

<sup>6</sup> Remember this—a farmer who plants only a few seeds will get a small crop. But the one who plants generously will get a generous crop. <sup>7</sup> You must each decide in your heart how much to give. And don't give reluctantly or in response to pressure. "For God loves a person who gives cheerfully." <sup>8</sup> And God will generously provide all you need. Then you will always have everything you need and plenty left over to share with others. <sup>9</sup> As the Scriptures say,


*"They share freely and give generously to the poor.*

*Their good deeds will be remembered forever."*

Generosity entails freedom. Coerced generosity is a contradiction in terms. Paul asks the Corinthians to give generously out of their Christian freedom.

He is careful to emphasize that his appeal for generosity is not a command and that the Corinthians should not give out of reluctance or compulsion but as they have made up their minds. Paul is appealing to their new freedom found in Christ. But an unbridled freedom without direction and discipline will inevitably be co-opted by selfishness and greed.

God has freed us in Jesus Christ so that through the Holy Spirit we are free from the power of mammon so that we can be free to live a life of generosity.



**The Thanksgiving season is about rejoicing in the blessings that God has provided,** but let's be sure our focus is on the Lord of

blessing – instead of the blessings!

We read in Luke 5:3-11 that Jesus told His disciples to go into the deep waters and let down their nets for fish. When they did, their nets were filled up with fish to the point of breaking. Being fishermen and businessmen, they may have been tempted to start doing business. Hey! think how much they could make!

But God had a different purpose. The disciples' occupation as fishermen was just a vehicle for God to demonstrate His great power and love. He wasn't blessing them with fish so that they would get excited about fishing — He was blessing them with fish so that they could get their eyes off their fishing and on to the greater call He had for them! Thankfully, they left the fishing business and went off with the Lord to do great and mighty things.

Let's make sure we're not getting up wrapped up in fish! We seek the Lord for His blessings, prosperity, and success. But true discipleship is focusing not on the blessings of the Lord, but on the Lord of the blessings!

We can rejoice in our blessings this Thanksgiving season, but let's not dwell on them! Let's set our eyes on the Lord and the calling He has for us. When He sees that we have pure and willing hearts, He will be faithful to use us to accomplish His glorious plan!

GFCF invests in small-scale economic development, joins efforts to improve diet and health practices, champions soil conservation, and promotes awareness-raising and advocacy on hunger issues. Its grants serve community development programs in 32 countries.

“Whether your gift is an individual contribution, an ongoing 2¢-a-meal collection at the family table, the offering of a congregation or camp, or a one-time donation or memorial in honor of a loved one, your support of the Global Food Crisis Fund upholds the biblical command to lift the burden of the oppressed. ## DISASTER RELIEF VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES

Outreach Ministry Team is encouraging more of our Congregation to get involved in the Disaster Relief Program. All of our members that have spent a week or more at a workcamp have returned with a feeling of fulfillment and joy in being able to extend a helping hand to people in need of a safe and comfortable home after experiencing a natural disaster.

The October Brethren Highlights contained an article entitled, “Do WE Do Enough?”, and a second article entitled, “Do Something”. Both of those articles were written to stimulate our thinking and challenge us to do more.

No matter which programs we as individuals chose to help with, there is always plenty to do and a lot of work to be done in God’s Kingdom.

Disaster Relief Volunteers are needed for Indiana flood recovery in Monon, Indiana on the following weeks; October 17-23, November 7-13, and December 5-11. These trips will be groups from the Atlantic Northeast District and will likely have volunteers from several local Brethren Churches. There will be more trips scheduled in 2011 for this area and we will notify our members as soon as the schedule becomes available.

The Hurricane Katrina building site, in Chalmette, Louisiana will remain open through 2011 and needs volunteers for the week of December 5-11. And a new home rebuilding site will be opening in Tennessee in the area devastated by a flood in May of this year. Schedules will be available soon as plans become more finalized for this site.

Another great opportunity will be the Haiti Earthquake Response Workcamps. At the present time, there are three workcamps scheduled with the possibility of more trips being scheduled.

This month we are promoting a very exciting, worthwhile video that has been donated to the Library! The title is "Paper Clips"! Roger Ebert of the Chicago Sun-Times writes: "It is Straightforward Heartfelt and Genuine".

When the students of Tennessee's Whitwell Middle School began studying the Holocaust as a way to learn about tolerance and diversity, nobody could have predicted the results. In 2001, the Paper Clip Project culminated in a unique memorial that changed the lives of those who created it, as well as touching Holocaust survivors and countless communities.

Because Norwegians invented the paper clip and used it as a symbol of solidarity against the Nazis, students started collecting them to help visualize such vast numbers of victims. As word spread online and in the media, paper clips poured in from around the world. This inspiring documentary shows how even small-town students and educators can teach the world powerful lessons.

This is a MUST SEE video - a powerful reminder that "from little acorns, giant trees are born"!

## STARLIGHT TEA TO FEATURE FLUTE/ORGAN DUO!

On Saturday, November 13, 2010 at 7:00 pm in the Sanctuary, the Starlight Tea Concert Series will present *Due Solisti*. This international flute and organ duo, comprised of American organist Kathleen Scheide and Czech flutist Žofie Vokálková, has performed throughout the US, Czech Republic and Germany, and has recorded for the Dutch label HLM and the US label Raven. As the ensemble name suggests, the duo works and programs in a balanced partnership, usually including solo works for each performer as well as duos. Music and Vision described their sound as “a beautiful luminosity.”

In a typical year, Žofie Vokálková is featured in over 150 solo and chamber music concerts. A Prague native, Žofie is a graduate of Prague Conservatory. She has won prizes at a number of international performance competitions, has been an orchestral soloist in Europe, Asia, and the United States, and has been featured in numerous radio broadcasts and recordings. She is currently flute soloist for the orchestras Virtuosi di Praga and Prague Symphony Orchestra.

Kathleen Scheide teaches harpsichord at Westminster Choir College, and is Organist/Choirmaster at All Hallows Episcopal Church, Wyncote. She has concertized as an organ and harpsichord soloist throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe, the Far East and the Caribbean. Kathleen earned degrees in early music and organ performance at New England Conservatory, and a doctorate from The University of Southern California.

As with all Starlight Tea concerts, admission is free, with a free-will offering taken. Be sure to stay afterward for tea and cookies, and the chance to greet these fine performers!

A woman was asked by a coworker, "What is it like to be a Christian?"




