Jim and Doris met in an unlikely manner. Jim was from North Carolina and Doris from Millersville, PA. At 17 years of age, Jim graduated from high school. "I saw nothing in particular in my future, so I joined the Air Force," admitted Jim. While in the Air Force, Jim became a good friend with a fellow from, of all places, Millersville! This friend mentioned that his girlfriend (from Millersville) has a friend (a girl also from Millersville) and suggested that Jim write to his girlfriend's friend! After a bit of persuasion, Jim began the correspondence.

Jim and Doris wrote faithfully for over two years. They decided to meet in person when Jim returned from Alaska in October of 1952. "I'll be on a bench near Old Main at Millersville State Teachers College," directed Doris who, at the time, was an elementary education major on that very campus.

To make a long story short, Doris and Jim liked what they saw and were wed February 4, 1956. They recently celebrated 56 years of marriage!

Doris grew up in the Brethren in Christ Church. Jim was a "hard-shell Baptist"!

Both joined the Lancaster Church of the Brethren. Jim believes he may have been the first or second person to be admitted into the Lancaster COB without having to be re-baptized.

The Bridgemans have served faithfully as Deacons under Pastors Long, Bantz, Wampler, Dubble and Rill.

They have served on visitation committees, learned the art of communion bread baking, set up for communion services, delivered flowers to shut-ins, organized Christmas gifts for fellow parishioners, and sent greeting cards to those in need.

# FROM MY CLUTTERED DESK

*Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it.* (Proverbs 22:6)

Well, that sums up all of children and youth ministry wishes in a verse. So - how do you "train up a child"? Our kids (and I mean the kids of our church) are influenced by so many things. When you estimate the hours in a day and the number of days in a year - the actual time kids are "in" church to be "trained", it is really

rather small. But, it doesn't need to be insignificant. The church desires to share a life of striving to seek God and follow Christ's teaching and if we can begin that when we are young - it really is life changing.

When I think about my youth and what impacted me - I wasn't at church any more than kids today. It was normally the hour of Sunday School and worship on Sunday but, not every Sunday (we did a lot of camping and some traveling). I was in the choir from age 5 to 18 and that met for 30 minutes every Thursday night during the school year. We did do Vacation Bible School and we had "youth club" after school on choir night in Jr. High. So, I did spend time at my church.

I would have to say though, the most time I would spend really learning about faith was at camp, Camp Swatara. I went there from the third grade to, well, high school and then began to volunteer. It's really not a significant amount of time, about 144 hours for the average week and those times even aren't filled with only thoughts of praise and worship. They are filled with fun and laughter and nature and crafts and games and skits and eating together and music and singing and swimming and boating and hiking and well, everything that a week at camp can offer a kid to try and do. It is also a place to find God, to get to know God, to think about God, and to wonder about God. A child learns more

about who they are because it is sometimes the first time of being on your own, outside of your parents grasp and away from teachers. You have to learn to make a new friend or learn to deal with feeling a little alone, but you have this counselor that is there too, to look after you and they are with you doing the same things together and helping you. That camping experience taught me so much I could hardly wait to be old enough to be a counselor myself.

I never did get to work at camp for the summer but, I did counsel as a volunteer. Then, I even went back with my husband, David and led a camp or two. As Mason grew up, he went to camp and later he chose to be baptized there and completed his Eagle Scout project there too.

If you have a child - or a youth - or you know a child, not even at our church, who you think would consider being a camper for a week this summer at Camp Swatara, there are several people at church you can call on to learn more about it. - Donna Lunger (our Camp Rep.), Jamie Nace, David Byers (who's on the Board of Trustees), Mason Byers (who worked at Family Camp last summer) and even Gene and Cathy Mummau, who often take a week in the summer to be grandparents for an entire camp full of kids and I'm sure there are more... Our congregation covers 1/2 of the fee to go to camp and if there is a financial need there are scholarships through the camp to cover the rest. (and for parents - it's not a bad way to get some "me" time without a child or two - read while smiling) Going to camp or serving as a volunteer at camp can be part of **training a child in the way that he should go** - we can be sure to make it happen with just this simple invitation - to You!

(It's time to begin registering for summer camps - find the registrations at the bulletin board for camp Swatara across from the lower elevator entrance)

To whet your appetite - here is a brief review of one of our newest books -- "The Warmth of Other Sun," The Epic Story of America's Great Migration. This epic which was beautifully written by Isabel Wilkerson, a Pulitzer Prize winner, chronicles one of the great untold stories of American history: the decades-long migration of black citizens who fled the South for northern and western cities in search of a better life. From 1915 to 1970, this exodus of almost six million people changed the face of America.

The story is told through the lives of three unique individuals. The author brilliantly captures her subjects' first treacherous and exhausting cross-country trips by car and train and their new lives in colonies that grew into ghettos, as well as how they changed their new cities with southern food, faith and culture, and improved them with discipline, drive and hard work.

This bold, remarkable work is a superb account of an "unrecognized immigration" within our own land. It is beautifully written and with a depth of research. Check it out - you won't be sorry!! You will find it on the shelves in the Gathering Place.

## SOUP BOWL OF CARING UPDATE

So many folks have let me know how much they enjoyed sharing in the live auction of soup bowls for the Soup Bowl of Caring. I hope you get a chance to learn more about this organization and how much they do to encourage support of local food banks around the United States. The auction was held during our regular Youth Soup and Salad Work Camp Fund Raiser on February 5 (Super Bowl Sunday). Mike Snyder, who auctions regularly, held the crowds attention and helped keep to bid going higher and higher. When people ask me what I thought about the amount raised, the only way I can respond is "WOW, I was just hoping we'd raise some money and get cleaned up in time." (that's my practical side). But really, THAT WAS EXCITING! I wanted to be sure to share with all of you some of the statistics of the day.



- 12 youth and 6 parents designed and donated bowls for the auction (3 Jr. High and 9 Sr. High).
- We had 21 total bowls to sell.
- 27 people registered to bid during the auction and 18 different people won bids (some went home with several bowls!).
- 4 bowls sold twice!
- No bowl sold for under \$25 and the average bowl sold for \$52.00.
- The Highest one sale total was for the set of four bowls sold for \$188.00.
- Highest total sold twice was \$117.00 for Mason Byers' bowl - "Valentine's Day". It also brought the highest single bid - \$65.00.
- The second highest youth bowl sold twice had a total bid of \$92.00 for Colin Betz's bowl - "Yellow and Green Stripes".
- The second highest single bid for a youth bowl was Cory Betz's at \$53.00 for his bowl titled "Work in Progress".
- For the parents, Mary Snyder's bowl sold twice to total \$105.00 and included the second highest bid at \$60.00.
- Total money raised at the auction came to \$1,191.00.

There were some additional funds also donated to the cause to make the final total cash donation - \$1,289.00. We should also include the food items that were do-

nated from the "Meal With Jesus" that also went to the Lancaster County Council of Churches Food Bank. Let us not forget that this was a Soup and Salad Fund Raiser, and the total Work Camp money donated was \$935.00.

So, if this one day reflects the generosity of the congregation, it was a truly blessed event.

Thanks to all of the youth and parents and our church families who made this a SOUPER Auction!
