PALM SUNDAY THROUGH EASTER 2012

On Palm Sunday, April 1, there will be baptisms

at the 10:15 a.m. worship service in the sanctuary at the top of the worship order. After baptisms, those who plan to worship in one of the other worship services are free to move to those locations.

On Maundy Thursday, April 5, we gather in the Family Life Center for Love Feast and Communion to remember and enact the events and lessons of Jesus and his disciples Celebration



in the Upper Room. Examining our relationship with our Lord and with each other precedes eating the agape meal, feet washing, and bread and cup communion. A Tenebrae Service will be held immediately following the Love Feast and Communion. The word "tenebrae" is Latin for "shadows." The purpose of the service is to recreate the emotional aspects of the pas-



sion story. We start that service in candlelight. There are as many candles as there are Scripture readings, plus a white Christ candle. After each

Scripture passage is read a candle is extinguished, until only the Christ candle remains. Then, after the last scripture passage is read the Christ candle is put out, leaving us in total darkness—a powerful experience, reminding us of the death of Jesus on the cross on Good Friday. At this point the service ends. There is no benediction and, after the lights are turned up enough for us to see, the people leave in silence.

On Sunday, March 8, Easter worship services will be held at 6:15, 8:00, 9:00, and

two at 10:15 a.m. to celebrate that Christ is risen from the grave!

Morning Psalm worships at 9:00 and 10:15 a.m. in the Family Life Center.

The traditional services at 8:00 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. will be held in the sanctuary. In both services the Chancel Choir will



sing and Matt Kramer will sing "The Holy City." People from the congregation will be invited to join the choir in singing "The Hallelujah Chorus" from Handel's Messiah.

As we journey through Lent to Holy Week may you draw nearer to God through Jesus, the Christ, as we worship together in the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. Consider inviting a friend or family member to come with you to worship for the blessings it offers.

LOVE FEAST

The Love Feast service has been very precious to the Brethren over the centuries and to this very time. It was first observed in America in 1723 in the Germantown Church and has been a significant part of the Church of the Brethren ordinances every year since then.

In our Lancaster congregation, Love Feast has been held twice a year on Maundy Thursday on the eve of Good Friday and on Worldwide Communion Sunday which is always the first Sunday in October. This year however, there will be three of them since one was already held in January and was called "A Meal with Jesus."

Love Feast includes at least four segments: a time for examination and reflection, a meal with remembrance of the Lord's Supper the night before His crucifixions, feet or hand washing also harking



back to the Holy Supper, and the Eucharist highlighting the Bread and Cup Communion.

Our next Love Feast is fast approaching on **Thursday, April 5,** at 7:00 p.m. in the Family Life Center. All LCOB members and friends are urged to attend as it is a most significant spiritual and sacred occasion. Our Lord, who we are remembering intensely during this event, told us that we are blessed if we observe the elements that were observed at the Last supper (John 13:17).

For those of our congregation who find it difficult to get down to wash feet but prefer being a part of the feet washing instead of the hand washing, Deacons will be available at each table to wash feet of those so inclined. Childcare is available for children 0-5 years.

Our third Love Feast in 2012 will be held on **Sunday, October 7,** which is Worldwide Communion Sunday. This will include some of the innovations employed at the "A Meal with Jesus" occasions.

Pew Communions at LCOB are held three times a year at all Sunday a.m. worship services. One was just held on the first Sunday of Lent, the next one will be on Pentecost Sunday on May 27 and the final one on the first Sunday of Advent which is December 2.

On Thursday, April 19, at 7:00 p.m. the Starlight Tea Concert Series will welcome the PENN STATE CONCERT CHOIR! We are thrilled to present this special mid-week concert from one of the top choral ensembles in the Commonwealth!

The Penn State Concert Choir, under the direction of Dr. Lynn Drafall, is comprised of undergraduate and graduate student musicians representing the Penn State School of Music as well as other areas of study within the University. Presenting several concerts each semester on campus, the Choir also tours extensively

in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and has also expanded its outreach with concert tours of



New England, Louisiana, and the Southwest. International audiences have heard performances of the Penn State Concert Choir in Germany, Austria, Switzerland, and Italy. Most recently, the Choir toured England and sang concerts in London, Stratford, Bath, Wells, and Salisbury. In addition to singing unaccompanied music of all historical periods and styles, the Concert Choir also regularly collaborates with instrumental ensembles to perform the great major works of the repertoire.

Dr. Lynn Drafall is an Associate Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at The Pennsylvania State University. She teaches courses in graduate and undergraduate choral conducting and literature, and conducts the Penn State Concert Choir as well as the Oriana Singers. An active festival conductor and adjudicator, she has worked with festival choirs throughout the mid-West and mid-Atlantic, and has conducted All-State high school choirs in Illinois, Pennsylvania, West Virginia, New Jersey, Delaware, and Maryland.

EMERGENCY CLEAN-UP BUCKET PROJECT

The Outreach Ministry Team and the Climbers Fellowship Group have announced a new project. Five

gallon buckets will be packed with cleaning products which will help communities to begin the overwhelming task of cleaning up after a flood, tornado, hurricane, or other disaster. These families may not have a way to get to a store, or there may not be a store



that survived the disaster. They need our help.

Each Bucket include:

One five gallon bucket with a reusable lid

Five scouring pads

Seven sponges, assorted sizes

One scrub brush

Eighteen reusable cleaning towels

One 50 - 78 oz. box of dry laundry detergent

One 12 oz. bottle of concentrated Household cleaner

One 25 oz. bottle of liquid disinfectant dish soap

One package of 50 clothespins

Clothesline, 100 feet

Five dust masks

Two pair of latex gloves

One pair of work gloves

Twenty eight heavy duty trash bags (30 -45 gallons)

One 6-9 oz. bottle of insect repellent

Each bucket costs about \$56.00 and can mean much more than that to the families that have just experienced a disaster. To help finance this project make checks payable to LCOB, and mark the memo line for Clean-up Buckets. The Climbers Fellowship Group will pack the buckets and take them to the Distribution Center in New Windsor, Maryland to be ready for distribution when needed at various disaster sites throughout the United States.

APRIL'hU u'- NERGY TIP'

The water heater is the 2nd largest energy user in most homes. Your water heater accounts for 11% of your energy bill, second only to your home's heating system, according to the U.S. Department of Energy. One reason is because we use a lot of water. Another reason is because we actually pay twice for water. You pay one bill for the cost of the water itself. Then you pay a second bill for the cost of heating that water. Reducing the amount of hot water you use will save money on both bills.

WHAT DOES THE LORD REQUIRE OF YOU?

"He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and walk humbly with your God?" Micah 6:8

We may not readily think of the word "justice" when

we think about feeding the hungry, but hunger and homelessness are very much about inequality. This is a justice issue. Micah reminds us that justice is about being kind to others, especially those who lack the basic necessities of life. To walk humbly with God is to keep our *wants* and *needs* in a proper balance.

As you know, we support the Food Bank of the Lancaster County Council of Churches through our regular 2 Cents a Meal offerings and our direct gifts of food. Since the Council can purchase at the very low cost of \$.18 per pound, some have been questioning our need to give food. That question was raised with the LCCC Food Bank. Answer: "The State Food Bank, where we purchase food at a reduced cost, is frequently out of the food we need. We publish a list regularly of those items that are low on our shelves or we do not have at all. So, we need both—the dollars and the food."

We publish the needed items frequently in our bulletins, and you will find a list on the Outreach Ministry Team bulletin board in the hallway near the Heritage Center.

This school year the Youth Ministry has made a greater effort to embrace and engage the youth whose families attend the Maranatha Fellowship services.



Many of their Jr. High age youth attend our Sunday School classes and join us on Weds. Nights. Now, they are also involved in our scheduled youth events and district events too. It's a very unique situation where these kids are part of our youth ministry and part of the Spanish speaking fellowship. They bring a lot of enthusiasm and diversity to our youth experience. Almost all of the kids are bi-lingual but speak English primarily when

not at home. We are very blessed to welcome them to our youth family.

On April 22 The Maranatha Fellowship will hold a "Spanish Meal" to raise funds to support the youth of their congregation. Many of the youth families are new to the United States and struggle to get established. These funds will be used to help welcome all of their children to be active in Youth events throughout the year. This money will be set aside for the fees that come along in attending the things we do as a youth group.

The meal will be held around **11:30** (after the 10:15 service) in the Family Life Center and will include musical performances, pantomime, dance praise performance, and other special music by the Maranatha Fellowship.

Plan to come and enjoy the Great Spanish dishes and offer support to help these Great Youth stay connected and involved with the youth fellowship.

Dear "Family at LCOB,"

It seems that Rich and I have been leaning hard on our church family since Austin's death in February and my recent hospitalization. No words can adequately express our appreciation for your love, prayers, telephone calls, visits, food and gifts. The visits by Pastor Rill and Calvin also meant a lot to us. I hope we can soon be on the giving end again!

BE A PART OF WORLD PEACE

As some may be aware, in addition to my work with the Youth Ministry, I am also involved with International High School Exchange Students. As a Local



Coordinator, I am an independent contractor for a non-profit placement organization. The organization I am now

working for is called **Northwest Services PEACE Program**. This organization is based in Idaho and has several types of students to place with host families. Students become exchange students through several types of programs both short term (several weeks) and long term (several school years). Some programs are for improvement of English, some are for long term education, some are interested in cultural exchange. Most recently, I have placed and hosted those whose Visa is for 5 to 10 month academic stay for cultural exchange and education.

There are many reasons we got involved. We enjoy youth! We love to share our culture and learn about the world. We wanted our son to experience having a sibling. (He now has 3 sisters and 1 brother who live in Europe.) We wanted to have more kids. (This was much easier and less expensive than other ways to expand our family) The students who have lived in our house think of us as their American family. We have a special experience parenting them when they live with us and connecting with their families back home who trust us to love them and care for them while they live with us for the school year.

The agency I am working for has a distinct interest in using these exchange experiences to encourage peace among cultures and people. They are involved in placing students with a J-1 Visa through the Kennedy-Lugar Youth Exchange and Study (YES program - for short). This program is to encourage cultural understanding between youth of predominantly Muslim countries and Americans. This is only one of the programs I will be placing. There are also students coming from countries like Germany, Spain, Demark, Sweden, Italy, Belgium, Ecuador, Brazil, France and Columbia.

If you would like to learn more about how you can invest in future World Peace and use your parenting skills to share more of your heart - I'd love to talk to you. Host families can be single adults, retired, have young children, have older children and have no children. All you need is a bed for them to sleep in, time to share your cares and concerns for them, and the

ability to provide meals and a safe environment. Host families are volunteers and are not paid.

For us, the experience has been life changing. We have grown in ways we would never have experienced and we have touched the world through our students.




