FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC'S DESK

was speaking on the phone last week with a member of our choir who is recovering from surgery. In the conversation I mentioned that it was my turn to write this column for May, and her response was imme-

diate: "You should write about the loving and caring nature of our choir!" It was on her mind, because she has so recently been the recipient of that loving care, and I realized it is indeed a wonderful thing to celebrate.

Do you remember Tim Tanner, who several years ago was our Minister of Education? He was such a thoughtful young man. He once said to me, "The LCOB choir for me exemplifies

the sort of caring and service that exemplifies the best of the Brethren nature." Quite a compliment! Our choir is a community that is about much more than singing, even though they are very serious about that service too. Here are some ways that they exemplify "Brethren service."

- 1. They love one another. There is a joy in being together that is immediately evident to new members of the group. Our time of gathering is one of many hugs and warm greetings, and choir members know a lot about each other's lives, families and interests.
- 2. They are intentional in their service to each other. When someone is ill or has a life setback, the group is quick to surround them with many expressions of love and concern, whether it be cards and calls, meals delivered, "love offerings" of money or time, and more.
- **3.** They are consistent in their service. They take Galatians 6:9 to heart, which admonishes us to "...

be not weary in well doing." Some of our choir members have literally dedicated years of service to refugee families, and to service projects in our church.

4. In serving, they reflect the love of God. We have been given so much by our gracious Lord! Our service to each other is a reflection of God's love and a joyous outpouring of our response to that love.

Of course these beautiful traits of service are reflected by many other groups in our congregation! It's why Pastor

Cindy is leading a push for more "small groups" in our church right now. It's easy to get lost or remain anonymous in a congregation of hundreds of members, but much harder to "fall off the radar" if you are a member of a group of 10 or 20 or 30. Find a group in this congregation that shares your passions for service, and join it, or if you can't find one that shares your passions, start one!

On Sunday, April 12, Pastor Jeff preached a sermon in which he noted the ways that the early church cared for each other. He quoted the early church leader Tertullian, who wrote in Latin to explain Christians to the pagans of the Roman Empire. He said, "Look how they love one another!" In this, he echoed John 13:35, which says, "By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." This is how we are to live, in joyous love and service to each other, so that all who look will exclaim at that love! May we do so individually and together, celebrating the bonds of love that unite us in Jesus Christ.

NEW MAJOR FUND DRIVE TO BEGIN

The Lancaster COB is a very generous congregation. In January of 2013 our congregation approved a 3-year fund drive with a goal to raise at least \$100,000 to support the Mobile Health Clinics in Haiti. When we celebrated the completion of this most recent fund drive at a Soup and Salad luncheon on November 23, 2014, we had raised \$104,500 in less than two years. This is quite an impressive accomplishment!

Now the Outreach Ministry Team and the Church Board are recommending that we begin a second major fund drive as envisioned in our 2020 Goals. Our goal is to raise \$100,000 over the next 5 years in support of the new Food Hub of the Lancaster County Council of Churches. This money will go towards the LCCC's goal of \$2.5 million needed to pay for and renovate a 27,000 square foot building at 812 N. Queen Street which will be used for the establishment of not only a greatly expanded food bank, but also an educational center for nutrition and financial classes, an expanded clothing bank, PA Workwear & Wheels to Work programs plus administrative offices.

Our giving in support of the Nigerian Crisis Fund will continue for the time being. So far donations totaling \$24,658.73 have been received to support our brothers and sisters displaced by violence in Nigeria.

With anonymous pledges totaling \$50,000 as a matching grant for the Food Hub, our congregation needs to raise another \$50,000 to achieve our total goal of \$100,000 by 2020. With our generous giving record, the Lancaster Church of the Brethren can surely accomplish this goal, perhaps in less than 5 years. Your contributions to the Lancaster County Council of Churches should be made to LCOB with Food Hub clearly marked in the memo.



"GOD DOESN'T DO FRACTIONS"

On January 29 of this year more than 50 volunteers from the Lancaster County Coalition to End Homelessness combed graveyards, parks, woods, and downtown areas to locate homeless persons. They found 359 homeless persons. This is fewer than 498 in 2014 and 666 in 2009. A Coalition spokesperson indicated that a "housing first" approach is credited with the decreasing numbers. Previously a "housing ready" model had been used that put resolving a homeless person's issues ahead of housing. (from news article by Jeff Hawkes in the March 9 LNP newspaper.)

Why should we be concerned about the homeless, whether the number is 359 or higher? Jesus, in the parable of the lost sheep (Luke 15), tells of a shepherd having a hundred sheep and one of them strayed. The shepherd left the ninety-nine and searched for the lost one until he found it. Then he put it on his shoulders with joy, took it home, and told his friends and neighbors to rejoice with him.

Clarence Jordan, in his Cotton Patch Parables of Liberation, comments on this parable: "God doesn't go by the kind of arithmetic that you and I go by. God has never learned to deal in fractions . . . It's just that way with love. There is no fraction in it. You can't break it up into pieces. And God wants the whole human race. He just can't deal in fractions."

"And so Jesus is saying to these people who were griping and mumbling and grumbling about the fact that he was taking in all kinds of people, bums and drunks and the poor folks and everybody, he was saying, 'Well, I just can't help it. God just has a sentimental attachment for his people. And, whether you like it or not, God loves 'em, and it does seem to me that if they're precious in God's sight, they ought to be precious in yours, too."

Who are the homeless? According to Jesus, we are included in the homeless count.

BYERS' MISSION TRIP UPDATE

We are grateful; Tiffany sent a quick email to remind us to write a message for this newsletter. Our lives are full and busy working with teams, taking care of the daily tasks regarding the camp and preparing for the regular evening events each day. This week our team is a group of 7 ladies from a church in Farmington, Missouri. The youngest member of the team is 51 and the oldest is 81! We love getting to know everyone who comes to serve. I think this is the oldest group we have had working with us.

A week ago we welcomed our youngest group so far, 4th and 6th graders from Freeport Bahamas with their teachers. They came for the Easter weekend to learn about Bahamian history and have fun. Most Bahamian's don't get the opportunity to travel around their own country because it is expensive to get from island to island. These students attend a private school. A trip like this would be impossible for any public school in the country.

The island of Eleuthera is really the historic hub of the country. There is a place here called **Preacher's Cave** which would be like our Plymouth Rock and the

settlement of Governor's Harbor would be like our Williamsburg, VA settlement. Each Friday I get to share what I have learned about the history of

the Bahamas with our teams when we take excursion day on their last day on the island.

On weekdays we have teams out in the community doing plenty of work. David and I lived in two different locations for a week in March. I was working with a team on the southern part of the island while David stayed back at the main camp. I was sleeping on an air mattress in a church fellowship hall with the team while he was back at our house (the 12x12 room) in a bed. However, David was hosting 55 teens and adults while Bush (one of our GREAT Bahamian site leaders) and I only had 9 team members to lead.

The stories of the people we work for vary greatly. Our teams have been helping a gentleman named **Nebert** by building him a completely new house. He has been living in his car for the last 7 years. One of the team members even bought him his first piece of fur-

niture, a plastic porch chair. Nebert is so grateful to now have a home.

We have helped a family who has been living with relatives because they have a child with major medical expenses and had no way to complete the home they started years before. We are helping, Santeesha, a mother who left her abusive husband. We are restoring an abandon home for her and her 3 boys. Until this home is finished she is living in her uncle's home. Another home which fell into disrepair is the home of Mr. Dewitt White who is in his 70's. He had to abandon it over 10 years ago and move in with his daughter. Mr. White now has a new roof and we will begin to restore

the floor and replace all of the doors and windows.

We so appreciate all of your love, cards and support for us and Mason too. We look forward to when you may get the opportunity to visit our work in person!



The following classes are open to everyone. All are invited. Even though these groups are "ongoing," they are always looking for new members!

9:00 - 9:45 Sunday Mornings

The Chapel Bible Study Group meets in the Chapel. The theme in May will be *One in the Bond of Love*, using scriptures from 1 Corinthians, 3 John, and Acts. Teachers will be Al Cott, Bob Frick, and Calvin Wenger.

Sacred Parenting Class, led by **Linda Husted** in room 170, is designed for parents of children ages 0-12, but is open to anyone. 
