FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

A fter overhearing that she would become pregnant, Sarah has this response in Genesis 18:12 (The Message): Sarah was far past the age for having babies. Sarah

laughed within herself, "An old woman like me? Get pregnant? With this old man of a husband?"


There is a lot in a laugh – much more than humor! Sarah is probably shocked, scared, excited, doubtful, and plain unable to wrap her head around the news. Unexpected blessing brings up a wide range of emotions – emotions that need to find their way out. Laughter is pretty good medicine for those situations.

When Ben and I first saw the image of two little babies on the ultrasound screen,

we also laughed -laughed until we cried. We were shocked, scared, excited, doubtful, and plain unable to wrap our head around the new reality. Unexpected blessing is emotional because unexpected blessings are also upended expectations. God has a way of working in our lives in the middle of these things; we have to look for that work though. We also have to work through the grief, doubt, and fear that come with upended expectations.

There is a lot of change going on around us right now – and some of it involves upended expectations. There are changes in our national zeitgeist as conversations shift and move around racism, sexuality, symbols, rhetoric, and justice. There are changes in our church as we prepare for our second maternity leave together, as new folks join us and others move on, as programs, classes, and worship services seek God and each other in new ways. Sometimes we face situations together that shock, scare, and excite us about what we discover in the process of change. Sometimes we cannot wrap our heads around the new. Sometimes we may need to laugh – not to disparage or make light of serious situations or feelings – but to get the emotions out. Some-

times we laugh – because we know that our upended expectations can also make a way for unexpected blessings.

We will happily take your cards, emails, and texts when the time comes. Of course – we hope the NICU expectation gets upended and we just get to bring two healthy boys home immediately - that's our prayer and we so appreciate your prayers for the same! Once we're all home, feel free to give us a call to find a good time to come by. We look forward to introducing the boys to the church family that has already shown them (and us) so much love. --Pastor Cindy Lattimer

HOMELESS STUDENTS

Those of us who have never been homeless can only imagine the anxiety, fear, and the sense of helplessness connected with such a life, especially so if one is a child. Children have a right to expect adults to provide for them, support them, and care about them. However, that is not the case for far too many children. As we have been reporting in the **Be An Angel**



news, the School District of Lancaster anticipates 1000 -1200 homeless students during the 2015-2016 school year.

What is it like being a homeless student? It does not necessarily mean the student is living on the streets or in a shelter, though that happens all too often. It literally means the child/youth has no permanent address. Perhaps an example will enhance our understanding. Mary (not her real name) is 12 years old and she lived with her mother and her mother's boyfriend. The boyfriend sexually abused her. To avoid him, Mary ran away from home. Mary begged her mother to leave with her, but her mother has no means of support. Mary is living with her close friend's family. That family already has six children and Mary will need to find another home when school opens. She has no money, few clothes, and she has no idea what to do. What will happen to Mary?

Mary's grandmother lives a few blocks away, but Nonna can barely care for herself. She loves Mary deeply, but she is incapable of providing her a home. If Mary is lucky, she might get placed in a good foster home. The chances are that Mary will live in a half dozen homes during the 2015-2016 school year. She will have a roof over her head, a place to sleep, and enough food to eat, but no place to call home. Mary is homeless.

Mary's type of story will get duplicated 1000 times during the next school year. Mary is a good kid, and a very good student. This August she must have a uniform in order to attend classes. Her uniform from last year is much too small.

Our **Be An Angel** effort will not provide Mary with a home, but it will enable her to continue her education. A uniform may not sound like much to us, but to Mary it is a life-line that hopefully will lead to a better future.

Outside the budget we support two seasonal projects.

 Heifer International—coordinated by Susan Adsitt—just in the 2014 Christmas season alone there were 9 Heifers, 5 Knitter's Baskets, 4 Water Buffalos, 3 Llamas, 2 Goats, 2 Sheep,

2 Pigs, 2 Tree Seedlings, 4 Trio of Rabbits, 1 Honeybee Colony, 4 Flocks of Chicks, 3 Ducks/Geese and a *Partridge in a Pear Tree*. Totaling about \$9350.

Also, outside the budget are **Fund Drives**. LCOB was involved in a fund drive to aide Haiti Mobile Health Clinics and last fall the contributions ended with \$104, 500! The latest fund drive over the next 5 Continued on next page.

years is to collect \$100,000 in support of the new Food Distribution Center for the LCCC. We are blessed that two anonymous members of our congregation have pledged \$50,000 as a matching fund. Now it is our turn to support this by giving \$10,000 a year for 5 years.

Other fund drives include contributions to the Linda and David Byers mission in Eleuthera, Bahamas, and the on-going EYN Disaster Fund. So far, \$25,000 has been transferred to the CoB General Board EYN Disaster Fund.

All these efforts require a great deal of our financial resources. At the same time there are opportunities where we can make a difference that do not require monetary outlays.

For more than five years Rus Adsitt has been taking volunteers to New Windsor, MD, to check and repack Hygiene Kits for Church World Service or to SERRV, where we pack items from Third World Countries for shipping to the various locations in the US to sell. This LCOB service was started by David Creighton.

At the same time there is the opportunity for volunteers to help at the LCCC Fud Hub at 812 N. Queen Street in Lancaster to sort, store and repack donated food for distribution. At least four members of our congregation serve several times a week.

Also, for several years two members of OMT/H&P, (Outreach Ministry Team and Hunger & Poverty Group), volunteer once a month to distribute food to the shut-ins at Church Street Towers in Lancaster.

There are even more volunteer opportunities available.

- The Pathfinders Fellowship Group has been organizing and assembling Hygiene Kits twice as year for more than 15 years.
- Twice a year Deb Chillas and David Heck organize the Community Meals for the homeless in Lancaster at First Reformed Church UCC.
- Several members of LCOB have served in Brethren Volunteer Service (BVS).

Thank you to all who volunteer and serve in these community outreaches, with your time and/or your financial contributions. All volunteers experience that giving is more rewarding than receiving. --Otto Schaudel for OMT and H&P

What your Contributions are Doing for Our Nigerian Families

So far, because of the generosity of Churches like yours, more than 20,000 displaced persons have received emergency food and basic materials from the EYN Disaster Team.



Three large tracts of land have been purchased by Church of the Brethren Nigeria (EYN) for the building of Care Centers for dis-

placed people. At these Care Centers people are removed from the most dangerous areas of NE Nigeria. The large tracts of land will provide space where farming can begin and people will be able to resume "normal" life again.

Church of the Brethren is not only supporting EYN in our Crisis Response but also four NGOs (Non-Governmental Agencies). One of them is providing livelihoods for people who have lost everything.



The leaders of the NGOs are proving to be people who really care. Sewing machines, bean cake making supplies and grinding machines are giving desperate people hope by setting them up with a business of their own. Another important area as part of the recovery program is trauma and reconciliation work. Together with Mennonite Central Committee we are training trainers for these restorative workshops. After the training, these Nigerians will be able to minister to those most affected by trauma associated with the terrible vio-

lence perpetrated by the Boko Haram. This area of the recovery is critical for Nigeria to move forward peacefully. Education is



another area that needs our help in order to meet the

needs of the many children who have been adversely affected by the violence in the Northeast. Another of our NGOs is concentrating on getting children back into school. Most of the schools in the Northeast have been closed down for over a year (some for two years).

Because you care, young students are able to enroll in existing schools. We are currently supporting one elementary school in Jos (200 students) and one in Bui (300 students).

Our other NGOs are also doing great things for the people of Nigeria. Dr. Rebecca Dali, wife of EYN president, Samuel Dali, heads up an NGO that acts as a first responder to people in need. Not only has she distributed food and supplies to many of her people she is keeping detailed records of those that have been displaced and those that have been killed as a result of the violence. Our fourth NGO has built a camp near the capi-



tol city of Abuja (out of harm's way) that is populated by both Christians and Muslims. This unique experiment is seen as a model for reconciliation between the faith groups. Markus Gamache, recently toured the western states speaking about the crisis and how his NGO has responded thanks to the people of the United States. Lastly, our efforts have assisted EYN in their attempts to continue operations by supporting their Majalisa (Annual Conference) and other conferences that are normally held on an annual basis.


