## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

#### Welcoming MOMO

"Let mutual love continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it."—Hebrews 13:1-2 NRSV

**D** ecently, my children and I have enjoyed reading a N book we picked up at our local library entitled, "My Cousin MOMO."1 Zachariah O'Hora writes the story of a squirrel family looking forward to hosting their out-of-town, cousin MOMO. When MOMO arrives for his visit the cousins are very excited. Yet, the cousins learn, MOMO is not the ordinary squirrel. MOMO dresses funny. MOMO doesn't play hide-and-seek or acorn pong like the other squirrels. MOMO is a flying squirrel. Most striking of all, when MO-MO plays super-heroes with his cousins, instead of the traditional mask and cape rescuers, MOMO costumes himself as "Muffin Man" and engages in imaginative play involving "pastry power" and doughnuts as trusty sidekicks. The cousins become disappointed with MOMO and in place of hospitality to their strange cousin, they show regret with having welcomed MOMO in the first place. One of the squirrels laments, "We should have invited Stinky George instead!" Overhearing the disdain with his presence, MOMO decides to leave. But the cousins apologize and learn that even though MOMO's ways seem different, sometimes strange and out of the ordinary, MOMO has transformed them to live more fully. "It turned out to be pretty fun having MOMO around," the squirrels conclude.

The writer of Hebrews would agree with the point of O'Hora's childish tale when stating in chapter 13 verses 1 and 2 that when we venture to entertain, extend hospitality to those who are strangers, something miraculous happens. Transformation occurs when the MO-MO among us, the "other" to us, is welcomed. One of the most poignant opportunities we have to offer welcome to the stranger is during our meal times. Christian ethicist Christine Pohl comments, "A shared meal is the activity most closely tied to the reality of God's king-

dom, just as it is the most basic expression of hospitality."2

In this season when many of us will gather around one festive table after another, may we consider ways in which transformational hospitality can be served. May we be intentional to break bread with a "stranger" even with an "enemy," to enable new relationships to be discovered and reconciliation expressed. May we confess our tendency to be isolated, surrounding ourselves with those with whom we always agree, preferring to

host the familiar "Stinky George" and missing the chance for angelic encounters. May we risk opening up our feasts this year to those strange, different family members and neighbors with whom God's generous gift of love and grace can be entertained through us.

"Look! I stand at the door and knock. If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in, and we will share a meal together as friends."3 It may be MOMO or it may be Jesus outside the door, knocking to come into our lives, our hearts, and to our tables. Will we open the door?



#### FORMER REFUGEES IN OUR MIDST

Today's social media is filled with stories about innocent victims of war in Syria and extreme poverty and hunger in Central America. The following story is a first-hand account from Friedlinde Kratz Ebersole of her days as a World War II refugee. Friedlinde will be telling more of her story at WNL (Wed. Night Live) on November 11 at 6:15p.m. in room 162.

"After WWII ended in 1945, our town had been confiscated, our houses and village burned. My mother Irene Kratz and I, several relatives and people from our town were placed in a Serbian communist concentration camp named Rudolfsgnad (Knicanin).

There was a constant scream: I am always hungry' in this camp. People died from famine, typhus, diphtheria, dropsy (swelling from hunger) and scurvy. I lost a grandmother, a brother and several cousins. We escaped from the camp by night in 1946-47. 20,000 of the 23,000 women, children and old people in this camp died.

During our escape we walked, from Yugoslavia to Hungary, sometimes only in knitted slippers and having only the clothes on our backs to wear.

When we arrived in Hungary, we were met by other refugees and the Red Cross. We were put on trains to Austria and were given a brown paper sack that held a boiled potato, a green apple and a piece of dark bread.

I have walked the walk and having experienced poverty like the present day refugees. But we were not mistreated as we crossed the borders and, although somewhat reluctantly, welcomed to refugee camps in Austria.

We remained in Austria for 3 or 4 years and received food and clothing from Church World Service, the Red Cross, and American churches." Friedlinde Ebersole

How can we continue to help to alleviate such terrible suffering? One small way we can help in our own community is by supporting the Lancaster Council of Churches' Food Hub with monetary gifts and by donating food to the food bank. Our next food bank collection is scheduled for Pew Communion on Sunday, November 29, 1<sup>st</sup> Sunday in Advent. --Hunger and Poverty



#### 2015 ATLANTIC NORTHEAST DISTRICT ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The Atlantic Northeast District 46<sup>th</sup> Annual District Conference was held on October 3, 2015, at Elizabethtown College. LCOB's delegates that attended were Donna Lunger, Jamie Nace, Eric Ramirez, Alix Sable, Ellen Weaver, Calvin Wenger and Pastor Jeff Rill.

The Moderator this year was Robert Kettering, and the theme he chose for this year was "Come to the Water" using the scriptures of Isaiah 55:1-3a and John 4:5-15. Kettering quoted, "District Conference is an opportunity to worship together, pray together, seek God's guidance together, network together, and grow together into the likeness of Jesus, who invites each of our congregations to come to the water drink from the well that will never run dry." Each congregation brought a container of water from their church and poured it into a small pool that was in front of the stage to created a fountain of all the congregations of ANE District.

Reports from agencies, retirement centers, colleges, committee's commissions, and the District Executive, Craig H. Smith were given. The ANE District Youth Cabinet gave a presentation of their experience of when they were baptized, and then they sang a Christian song called "Oceans." Three of the Youth Cabinet represent our congregation, and they are Ava Bowser, Gabriella Rodriguez (not present) and Edison Rodriguez.

The delegates voted and approved the 2016 Slate. Our senior pastor, Jeffrey Rill, was voted in to serve on the Annual Conference Standing Committee as a representative of Atlantic Northeast District.

The worship service speaker was Tom Zuercher, Pastor of Ashland Dickey CoB, and he spoke on "*Water Test-ing*."

The ANE District's budget is in the red as a result of congregations struggling with their budgets. As of August 2015, the district is behind over \$65,000. Statistics of the 79 congregations giving in the ANE District, 17 congregations have contributed nothing to the budget. 48 congregations have contributed less than the \$55 Fair Share per member, and 14 congregations have contributed their \$55 Fair Share or more.

Stats for the day, 71 congregations out of 79 of the ANE District were represented at the Conference. Attendance in the morning session was 270, afternoon session was 208, and at the worship service was 273. The offering collected was \$2,672 and that was designated for "District Projects" outside of the budget. 203 delegates were registered, and 190 attended the Conference. As for the slate, 160 ballots were counted, and 159 accepted the 2016 Slate.

At the end of the conference, Pastor Pam Reist of Elizabethtown came to the microphone and asked to reopen the agenda, to talk about the Annual Conference resolution from about 5 years ago, that was about "Ending Gun Violence" because of all of the gun violence that is happening at this time. A <sup>2</sup>/<sub>3</sub> vote was needed to reopen the Agenda and it did not pass. Then moderator Kettering suggested the ANE District Board to address this topic and report in 2016.

On a last note, Craig Smith asked that the delegates keep the District in their prayers, for there are a very high number of congregations looking for pastoral leadership at this time, with many pastors retiring. --Ellen Weaver


