

STARLIGHT TEA WELCOMES SUPERB OBOE/GUITAR DUO!

On Saturday, March 11, at 7:00 p.m., the Starlight Tea Concert Series will present the *D'Amore Duo*, featuring guitarist William Feasley and oboist Emily Tsai. Founded in 1991 to investigate the little known wealth of chamber music for oboe and guitar, the D'Amore Duo has toured internationally and domestically to enthusiastic reviews. Guitarist William Feasley was the first guitarist to receive Peabody Conservatory's



coveted Artist Diploma. A student of Andres Segovia, his playing has been described by the Washington Post as sounding "... like a 'small orchestra' in the variety of colors coaxed from a single guitar." Oboist Emily Tsai was praised by DMV Classical as having, "a consistently lovely tone and [taking] her melodic

twists and turns with stylish assurance."

The Duo has released three critically acclaimed recordings, and have twice been winners of the Baltimore Chamber Music Awards Competition. The Washington Post referred to the Duo as a "perfect partnership of sound" and lauded their performance as "one of the most uniquely satisfying concerts of the season."

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Taking Something Out To Make More Room For Someone

Growing up Baptist in southern Louisiana was weird. I loved Mardi Gras! The parades with the huge heaps of plastic beads, the plastic cups of milk or juice,



the doubloons stamped out of aluminum and anodized gold, the surrealist floats and their riders in exquisitely produced costumes. "Throw me sumthin, mistah!" everyone would cry out, hoping for the special doubloons or the higher class of beads.

I discovered Shrove Tuesday pancake breakfasts when I moved to Washington, DC, and about fasnachts when Sue and I married and migrated to Lancaster. Back home in Louisiana, we eat king cake, which is like a hybrid of a giant elongated donut and a ring of cinnamon roll dough covered in white icing and sprinkled in purple, green, and gold sugar crystals. (Can you feel your blood glucose level spiking?) The most important part of the king cake is the baby. After baking, a tiny plastic baby is inserted somewhere in the cake. The person whose slice contains the baby is responsible to host the next king cake party. In my parent's neighborhood, there is a "Krewe of Southdowns." My dad told me last week that the youth and college students from my home congregation will be at his house on February 28 for a parade party. King cake party season is in full swing.

When I was in my mid-twenties, I became the pas-

tor who introduced observance of the seasons in the Christian year into congregations that had never marked it before. Advent is pretty easy; Pentecost is not a big stretch. The hardest part was explaining the reason for putting ashes on forehead or hand.

Appropriately, just as successive generations of the Hebrew people asked "What's with this pile of rocks? Why is this night different than any other night?" I had to help congregants recognize value in taking the forty-day journey with Jesus that is called Lent and to embrace being driven with him by the Holy Spirit into desert places.

A few weeks ago, we were talking about fasting in youth Bible study. The discussion included:

- You can fast from anything not only a food but things like social media or even *gasp* binge watching Netflix.
- Fasting can be an opportunity to invite the Holy Spirit to break addictions in your life. If you can receive God's power to say "no" to something for 40 days plus Sundays) then it's a lot easier to go on from there.
- 3. Our souls can't sustain a vacuum. The point of fasting is that we abstain from something *in order to make space for God*.

So perhaps, instead of focusing on giving up something, think of it as a substitution -x number of minutes daily on social media for the same time spent in prayer and Bible study or serving your neighbors.

I invite you to embrace God's gift of Lent this year.

EASTER ANTHEM EXPLORES BIBLICAL IMAGES OF GOD

On Easter Sunday, the Chancel Choir will sing Z. Randall Stroope's anthem *Resurrection Day* in the 8:00 a.m. and 10:15 a.m. Traditional services in the sanctuary. The following essay by Jay Weaver gives a wonderful overview of the powerful Biblical imagery used in the anthem.

A Biblical View of God

This paper was inspired by the anthem entitled Resurrection Day written by Z. Randall Stroope and published by Morningstar Music Publishers. All of the following biblical references represent aspects of God. Stroope makes clear that God demonstrates all of these as exemplified in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. (All references are from the New Revised Standard Version of the bible. Nb. The NRSV uses LORD in place of Yahweh as the name for God.)

- **Fire of Elijah** Then the fire of the LORD fell and consumed the burnt offering, the wood, the stones, and the dust, and even licked up the water that was in the trench. I Kings 18:38. In the contest on Mt. Carmel between Yahweh and Baal, the fire called down by Elijah consumes everything, establishing Yahweh as the **One True God**.
- Strength of David's Arm David said, "The LORD, who saved me from the paw of the lion and from the paw of the bear, will save me from the hand of this Philistine." So Saul said to David, "Go, and may the LORD be with you!" I Samuel 17:37. It was the Mighty Arm of Yahweh who had given David the strength to kill the lion and the bear and who would give David's Arm the strength to defeat Goliath.
- **Lion of Judah** *Judah is a lion's whelp; from the prey, my son, you have gone up. He crouches down, he stretches out like a lion, like a lioness—who dares rouse him up? Genesis 49:9.* Jacob was dying and he gave a blessing to each of his sons. This quote is part of the blessing of Judah. The lion is known as the king of the beasts. The image here is of Judah as a kingdom. Yahweh is really the Lion **King** and Judah is the whelp (pup).
- **Promise of Abraham** He brought him outside and said, "Look toward heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them." Then he said to him, "So shall your descendants be." And he believed the LORD; and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness. Genesis 15:5, 6. Yahweh promised Abraham that he would be the father of a great nation. Although it seemed impossible at the time, God's **Promise** to Abraham was realized.
- Wisdom of Solomon God gave Solomon very great wisdom, discernment, and breadth of understanding as vast as the sand on the sea-shore, so that Solomon's wisdom surpassed the wisdom of all the people of the east, and all the wisdom of Egypt. I Kings 4:29, 30. The name of Solomon came to be associated with Wisdom. Yahweh alone gave Solomon the Wisdom for which he is famous.
- Rod of Moses The LORD said to him, "What is that in your hand?" He said, "A staff." And he said, "Throw it on the ground." So he threw the staff on the ground, and it became a snake; and Moses drew back from it. Then the LORD said to Moses, "Reach out your hand, and seize it by the tail"—so he reached out his hand and grasped it, and it became a staff in his hand—"so that they may believe that the LORD, the God of their ancestors, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob, has appeared to you." Exodus 4:2-6. Time and again Moses used the staff to perform miracles and wonders. Yahweh had turned Moses' staff into a Rod of Divination.
- Song of Miriam Then the prophet Miriam, Aaron's sister, took a tambourine in her hand; and all the women went out after her with tambourines and with dancing. And Miriam sang to them: "Sing to the LORD, for he has triumphed gloriously; horse and rider he has thrown into the sea." Exodus 15:20, 21. God had just allowed the children of Israel to cross the Red Sea on dry land and then allowed the water to return and Pharaoh's army was drowned. Miriam is singing the praise of Yahweh as the deliverer or Savior of her people.
- Tears of Jeremiah O that my head were a spring of water, and my eyes a fountain of tears, so that I might weep day and night for the slain of my poor people! Jeremiah 9:1. Jeremiah receives word from Yahweh that the nation of Israel will be destroyed and taken captive. Jeremiah, like Yahweh, Wept for his people.
- Faith of Joshua I hereby command you: Be strong and courageous; do not be frightened or dismayed, for the LORD your God is with you wherever you go. Joshua 1:9. God here is telling Joshua to take the people across the swollen Jordan into the land of Canaan. Again God dried up the river and allowed them to cross. The faith of Joshua in carrying out this order reflects the Faithfulness of Yahweh's continued presence.
- Lamb of God The next day he (John the Baptist) saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! John 1:29. John recognized Jesus as the Pascal Lamb. At the time of the Passover, the blood of the lamb was sprinkled on the doorpost to save those inside from the death angel. Likewise the Risen Christ, who had shed his blood, joins God in protecting the children of creation from the angel of death. Having become one with God, Jesus becomes the King of all Ages.

It is appropriate that we sing of the nature of our God and of his Christ as we celebrate the Resurrection of our Lord.


